Gil Gutierrez - Common Core Standards

Common Core Standards

To start, I'll ask the parents what they've heard about the CCSS.

Kristin Rone: We do know that they are starting to roll out the introductions, and that they've started the math information for parents.

Guest (John Scott Alexander): How does it compare to the existing standards?

Gil: 47 of the states have agreed to take this on. They are aligned to college standards, which they weren't before.

We're at a point now where Admin and lead teachers are getting an overview of what the standards will look like and we're starting to at a district level to see what testing will look like.

Teachers will be receiving professional development this year to align their training to the CCSS. 2014-15 will begin the testing.

Valerie Miller: If we're rolling it out in 2014, where is this curriculum?

Gil: There are teachers and consultants working on curriculum right now.

Some big changes in the classroom will be mathematics. The standards used to be very broad. They are looking to focus on fewer standards, as opposed to overwhelming the kids with too many standards. Algebraic thinking is built into the standards that will get them through to the first few years of college. Everything they touch on will build from K-12.

Skills, understanding and application. Moving away from doing simple multiplication problems, it'll require deeper thinking.

Valerie: the concern is more with my sixth grader who wasn't given the Common Core during K-5.

Gil: This is something that the whole nation will be experiencing. It won't all change at once. Expectations being properly communicated to the parents, the district will have to work with the parents to make sure there is an understanding about how things will change.

Laura: It sounds like it's going to be a very subjective grading process. How is that going to work?

Gil: Teachers will have to know and have examples of what proficient work looks like.

Melinda Albright: With math, we've seen them change how they implement math. Will schools be able to decide how they teach it?

Gil: It'll probably be state teachers standards in teaching as opposed to National Standards
The days of a kid sitting with their text at their desk and working independently will be changing.

John: How does this compare to seminar style classes:

Gil: It looks a lot like it.

John: How do you compensate for the different levels?

Gil: It requires the teacher to be more aware of the various learning levels. They'll need to change their interaction with students accordingly.

Valerie: Professional Development

Gil: There will be some big changes in ELA. 75% of the reading will be in non-fiction. Getting kids to focus on evidence from the text, versus opinion.

Text levels from K-12 will get more complex.

Listening and speaking will also be a bigger part of the standards assessments.

Laura: As schools, should we be preparing our parents for a decrease in scores (will that happen?)?

Gil: School sites are starting to have these conversations within their school sites, SSCs, DACs and PTAs. This is how the information will start to get out.

Melinda: Any idea of how the local private schools will handle this and how will it affect how they teach?

Gil: They really have never wanted to compete with the District in how they teach and how they assess.

Michelle Huber: How are they going to handle the roll-out with the older kids? If the kids should be getting all of this continual instruction from Kindergarten, will the 7th and 8th graders be able to achieve what's expected of them?

Gil: That will be challenge and the district will have to look at that. They'll have them take both tests next year and use it as a calibration tool for the roll out.

When we switched to the CSTs, they did the same thing and used weighted scoring and had some things in place to explain the variances.

Melinda: Any explanations to parents in the next year to see what may need to happen with their kids and with testing to prepare kids for the next grades?

Gil: Yes. There is information on the website.

Nicole: As I'd mentioned last meeting for the Walk & Roll Wednesdays, we've got Correia, Dana, Silver Gate and Ocean Beach participating. Kimberly is here with Sondag to help encourage students, parents, community members to ride or walk to schools.

Jack Vallerga, update on Correia:

Still surveying the staff. There have been weekly meetings where we are sharing information, asking questions, etc.

We are close to coming to a consensus on what our perfect school looks like.

We are still not at the point to where we are ready to be serious about becoming a charter.

Melinda: Would the charter be including everyone in the Pt. Loma cluster initially for student population and then from outside? How would it affect the flow of students from Dana to PLHS?

Kristin: How will it affect the articulation through the cluster? Will you still be accepting kids from Dana?

Jack: I think it's more of a question of whether or not the parents want their kids to attend our 7/8 charter.

Valerie: A lot of the charters in our neighborhood accept 75% from the boundary and 25% from outside. Is that something that would happen at Correia?

Jack: I don't see any reason why it wouldn't continue to be in the feeder pattern for PLHS. From the conversations I've been having, it would remain as such.

Michelle: My concern is that there was a charter in this cluster that said they'd be open to the community and then once they started, they locked us out. We couldn't get our kids in.

Matt Spathas (former cluster parent, community member) added some clarifying information on charter numbers.

Valerie: I know you're not certain of the charter direction, but is there like a top three that the teachers are looking at?

Jack: I haven't seen the results of the survey. I'll make sure to take these questions and concerns to the teachers.

New Business:

API is now 812!!

Detracked classes in English and Math, all learning levels together.

Paperless classrooms, using Google docs.

Real-life applications for math – creating wind chimes through a collaboration between the physics and calculus teacher.

Dance team, strong performing arts program

We recommend that all of the students participate in either sports or visual arts.

College and Career Technical Education is a large focus – teaching careers, sports medicine, music production and auto engineering. Students can get college credit for these courses.
