History

- Point Loma Cluster 30 years ago
 - 8 elementary schools K-6
 - Dana or Collier Junior High 7-9
 - (Based on residency in Point Loma)
 - Point Loma High School 10-12
- 1984
 - Dana Junior High was closed to cut costs
 - Collier site renamed Correia and made 7-8
 - Point Loma High became 9-12
 - Dana was vacant until 1987

History (cont.)

• 1987

- Dana repaired and authorized for use as an administrative center
- 1995
 - The bilingual Magnet program was phased out of Correia.
- 1998
 - Increased enrollment led to joint-use of Dana as a 6th grade school and admin center
 - Elementary K-5
 - Dana 6
 - Correia
 7-8
 - Point Loma High School 9-12

History (cont.)

- 1999
 - Point Loma Configuration Study initiated by John de Beck and Alan Bersin
 - Parents, community members, teachers, cluster principals and district staff involved.
 - Katz and Associates hired to assist in the study process
- 2000
 - The Board approved the recommendations of the Point Loma Cluster Study Implementation Plan

Current Configuration, Capacity & Enrollment Trends

• Grades K-4 attend Elementary Schools

• Grades 5-6 attend Dana

• Grades 7-8 attend Correia

K-4 Elementary Schools

* Since 1999-00, when Full Day Kindergarten & K-3 Class Size Reduction were fully implemented.

- At the present K-4 grade configuration, all schools except Loma Portal and Sunset View have a significant amount of extra capacity.
- Both Loma Portal and Sunset View have significantly increased their non-resident enrollment since Point Loma elementary schools reconfigured to K-4.
- The enrollment/capacity situation at these schools could be improved by returning non-resident enrollment numbers to their pre K-4 configuration levels.

• Both Correia & Dana have a surplus of capacity at their present grade configurations.

• Grades K-5 attend Elementary Schools

Grades 6 attend Dana

• Grades 7-8 attend Correia

- As with the present K-4 grade configuration, all schools except Loma Portal and Sunset View would be able to accommodate a K-5 grade configuration.
- Changes to Sunset View's and Loma Portal's present non-resident enrollment levels may permit them to reconfigure to K-5.

 The Dana site would be significantly under-utilized if it housed only 6th graders; Correia's enrollment and capacity is unchanged from its present status in this scenario.

• Grades K-6 attend Elementary Schools

• No enrollment at Dana

• Grades 7-8 attend Correia

- Three of the seven Point Loma elementary schools would not be able to accommodate a K-6 enrollment with present facilities and enrollment patterns. Another two schools would be at capacity.
- Dana would be left with no students in this scenario.

- What scenarios are possible for grades 6-8?
 - Two grades 6-8 middle schools
 - One grades 6-8 middle school; one school used for another district educational program that would be attractive to Point Loma residents

There are approximately 1,450 grades 6-8 students presently attending Point Loma schools

Middle School Configuration

- Two Middle Schools:
 - Each school would have approximately 725 students
 - Underutilization of both sites
 - May lead to need to consider part of the campuses for other uses (e.g. co-location with a charter school, per Prop. 39)
 - Program Improvement (NCLB) Issues: a PI middle school is eligible to send its students to non-PI middle schools
 - Boundary issues
 - District middle schools are generally in the range of 1,100 1,300 students

Middle School Configuration

- One Middle School; One district educational program:
 - Neither site currently has the capacity to accommodate approximately 1,450 students – more space would need to be added, and remodeling of either site may also be necessary.
 - The site with the larger capacity to accommodate all grades 6-8 students is Correia.
 - An attractive educational program placed at the Dana site may bring back some Point Loma residents who do not presently attend district-run schools.
